


Partisan Composition

- 21 majority Democratic delegation
- 29 majority Republican delegation (PA)
- ❖ 5 states sending more Ds than the
 118th (AL, CA, LA, NY, OR)
- ❖ 8 states sending more Rs than the 118th (AK, CO, MI, MT, NC, OH, PA, WV)
- ❖ 75 members serving for the first time
 - 12 new U.S. senators
 - 63 new U.S. representatives

This map shows the change in partisan compositions of each state's delegation. This includes states that became more Democratic and more Republican, as well as states that remained the same.

Change of composition:












Recycling Policy in Transition: Congress

- Lame Duck
 - Continuing Resolution (CR) likely, set to expire Dec. 20th
- 119th Expectations Q1
 - Senate Nominations (recess nominations?)
 - Reconciliation
 - Potential avenue for expired/expiring tax provisions
 - Appropriations
 - Filibuster to *likely* remain






Legislatures | 2024 Post-Election Partisan Breakdown

Major legislative chamber shifts in the 2024 elections are that Republicans flipped the Michigan House an tied the Minnesota Senate.





State Legislative Split Control

- Michigan
 - House flip from D to R control with 6 seat majority
 - Senate maintained D control with 2 seat majority
- Minnesota
 - House CURRENTLY flip from D to split control
 - District 54A: 14 vote margin D, with 20 votes being lost; R candidate challenging result
 - Senate maintained D control with 1 seat majority
- Pennsylvania: Continued split control
 - House D control with 1 seat majority
 - Senate R control with 6 seat majority
- Governors: Still 27 R 23 D split, with NH maintaining R and NC maintaining D
 - NC R legislature lost supermajority, Vermont D legislature lost supermajority
